I. Chairman's Report on the year 2015 – 2016

The report following gave an account of Council proceedings in the year March 2015 to March 2016 and the Council's aspirations for the future.

a. Major area grants 2015-2016

• Memorial Field	£6,000

d. Parish Development

- Two 'wigwag' speed warning lights to be installed on Field Road in April 2016
- A SID (speed indication display) device has been installed on the Somerton road
- Negotiated with Huish Leisure to have the existing defibrillator installed on the exterior of their building
- All know the parish has grown during the last 10 years – 500 houses either built or at the planning stage
- A new fire-proof dog bin installed opposite Huish House

What have we been up to in the last year, here's a brief overview

Stuff we have provided that contributes to youth development

- Drug Screening training attended by 2 workers
- Three of our volunteers undertook Youth Worker Level One training
- We took on a second year student from the Department of Psychology in the University of Hertfordshire on a two year placement
- Drug and alcohol awareness workshop and targeted sessions provided
- C Card has been widely used and local young people receive health advice from qualified workers
- Six Music Workshops were held, ending in a performance called Spirit Levels which took place during the Langport festival.
- Several Go Girls sessions held after requests from young people
- 1 young person has taken their food hygiene for the benefit of our club

- Birmingham day trip (museum, art centre, the new library, restaurant and fun fair visited)

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b. Memory Café Report

FORGET-ME-NOT MEMORY CAFÉ

The Forget-me-not Café has now been operating every Tuesday afternoon at the Angel in Langport for over three years. The Cafe regularly attracts between 6 and 12 clients and carers and every week we do a different activity. It has a very relaxed atmosphere, where we try to encourage clients to remember and talk about their lives and to provide an environment to stimulate them. The activities we do include: Name the Faces, 50s and 60s memory cards, Spot that tune, gentle exercises, talks, Christmas and Easter card making and other craft activities like creating flower arrangements or making a posy, plus:

playing games (usually dominoes or cards),
have tea and cake, and
concluding with a singalong

The Café is organised and run by Rotary volunteers and more recently with some help from local WI members. Although it is at the Angel, the Café has no connection with the Church.

We are always keen to welcome new members, which for many of our clients and carers is one of their weekly highlights. We have links with Langport Surgery and the Buttercross Surgery in Somerton. The Café is regularly attended by the Alzheimer's Society and Age Concern, who can offer Carers help and support.

It costs over £1500 per year to fund the Café and this is achieved through the Rotary Club of Langport and Somerton's fundraising and grants. Most recently this has included a very successful Barn Dance, a Horseshoe Tossing Competition and the Curry Rivel United Reform Church Christmas Tree Event. The very kind £500 grant from Huish Episcopi Parish Council is very much appreciated.

Our clients are elderly with differing problems, from short term memory loss to the onset of Alzheimer's, This facility helps the very vulnerable in our society in a safe, caring and fun atmosphere.

c. bibic Report

bibic REPORT

Becky explained that bibic, now established at Old Kelways, is a registered charity encouraging home-based therapy to help children variously diagnosed as having autism, autistic tendencies and brain damage. The Children's Therapists carry out an initial one day assessment of need, then the second day is used to set up a six month therapy course delivered at home. One in three of the children helped is from Somerset, although the charity is national. The charity is very aware that it needs to become more sustainable through fundraising and it has already launched a new website.
