

### April recycling site upgrade

Recycling sites are to open for longer at weekends, later on weekdays and see other improvements to match future use from Monday 1 April next year.

Reflecting users' demands, and keeping all 16 sites open, changes agreed by Somerset Waste Board include:

- All sites' year-round Saturday and Sunday hours 9am-4pm
- Later weekday opening in summer (to 6pm April-September) and winter (to 5pm October-March)
- Same number or extra days at 10 sites, including Chard and Wells
- Fewer days at six, including Crewkerne and Dulverton, the two sites with lowest use and highest costs, but an end to £2 cash entry fees by April 2020
- With low early user numbers, all sites will start work later, at 9am
- With later weekday closing, an end to underused 7pm Mondays

Full details of all the changes to each site from 1 April 2019 will be available on flyers at each site shortly, and on Somerset Waste Partnership's [website](#).

Site changes are part of Somerset waste services' transformation, from extra weekly recycling and three-weekly rubbish collections to the move away from landfilling refuse in 2020.

Here are simple steps to take now for a less wasteful Christmas:

- Start the festivities with empty bins and a clutter-free home by visiting a recycling site.
- Save glass jars (with lids); ideal for home-made gifts of foods, bath salts or flavoured drinks.
- Eat into your freezer and fridge now to save money for Christmas meals and the inevitable leftovers.
- Save cardboard boxes and glossy magazines to make gift bags. (Find crafty tutorials on the net).
- Reject unrecyclable shiny, glittery, plastic, holographic, metallic wrapping – only good for the rubbish bin – for paper wrapping that can be recycled with card (the less sticky tape, the better).
- Ask friends and family to write wish lists so all gifts are wanted. If they are happy to receive “pre-loved” items, find the right book,

computer game or clothing online or off, with less packaging free.

- Encourage children to make space for future presents by decluttering their bedrooms. Reusable toys can be either donated or sold on-line.
- Drop off batteries at high street stores for recycling and stock up with rechargeables to avoid gifts but no portable power.
